Mark Coltrain (00:00):

And it is April 30th, 2022. I, um, am here with Jerry Douglas, um, and, uh, we are on the campus of Wilkes Community College at MerleFest. Um, so Mr. Douglas, will you just start off by telling, for anyone who might not know who you are, telling them a little bit about y- yourself and your music.

Jerry Douglas (00:21):

Okay, my name is Jerry Douglas. I'm, uh, originally from Northeast Ohio, uh, Warren, Ohio and, uh, started playing bluegrass music. Was probably the first thing, first music I ever heard, was probably bluegrass music, and it was probably Flatt and Scruggs.

Mark Coltrain (00:41):

Hm.

Jerry Douglas (00:42):

Uh, but, uh, my father had a bluegrass band, so I grew up hearing the music live and watching his band, uh, work up songs, arrangements, and do things like that, you know, that, uh, something that really came, um, became im-, very important to me later in life becau-, as a record producer, as an arranger, and all these kind of things, you know, I kinda got a, uh, a- a good view of that way early in life, what it's like, you know, how you do this kinda thing. (01:13):

But- but, uh, but I play the dobro guitar. A dobro guitar is a, is a ... Dobro, first of all, is a shortened name for Dopyera brothers, who immigrated to the United States in the early '20s and, uh, first thing they did was create the National Steel Guitar in Chicago. And they moved from there to California and started building wooden-bodied, uh, instruments of the same kind and-and at the sa-, and at this same period there was a Hawaiian music craze running through the country because Hawaii had just been adopted as, you know, a foreign, our territory for us, uh, mu- much like Puerto Rico is I guess.-

Mark Coltrain (02:01):

Hm.

Jerry Douglas (02:02):

... but, uh, it was before Hawaii was a state, way before. But there was this huge craze for the music going through the, through this whole country, and people were, guys were going door-to-door selling, selling little kids Hawaiian, uh, guitar lessons, and they'd give you this little guitar, and then they'd come back every week and give you another lesson.

(02:23):

But, uh, dobro is played flat and it's got a s-, uh, hubcap on the top of it. (laughs) If you think of, uh, Dire Straits, "Brothers in Arms," I tell people to think about that, that's the metal version, I play the wooden version. And, uh, so I've been playing that since I was 11 years old, so I'm 66 almost. In a month-Mark Coltrain (02:48): Hm. Jerry Douglas (02:48): ... I'll be 66, so I've been playin' for, um, 50 years. Mark Coltrain (02:53): Great, thank you. Yeah, I've- I've done a little bit of research myself being a blues fan, and there, that- that, well there's a lot of cross-thread,-Jerry Douglas (02:59): Mm-hmm. Mark Coltrain (03:00): ... with the Hawaiian, you know, guitar and blues mu-, um, blues musicians-Jerry Douglas (03:03): Yeah. Mark Coltrain (03:03):

... back in the '20s and '30s.

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Jerry Douglas (03:04):
Yeah, that's why, uh, the, a lot of the blues players took-
Mark Coltrain (03:07):
Mm-hmm.
Jerry Douglas (03:08):
dobro guitars because they were loud enough, didn't, their voice didn't cover up their guitar-
Mark Coltrain (03:11):
Right-
Jerry Douglas (03:11):
so much.
Mark Coltrain (03:11):
yeah.
Jerry Douglas (03:12):
Yeah, [inaudible 00:03:13].
Mark Coltrain (03:13):
Thank you, thank you for that. Um, so, in terms of our questions, um, c-, if you have one, can
you share a favorite memory or two of the festival, or the Watson family, or both?
Jerry Douglas (03:29):

Probably both. I'm ... I was friends with Doc Watson before the festival, we had met, we had

played on stages together. And, you know, the first time I ever heard Doc Watson, though, was

on a Flatt and Scruggs record of course, "Strictly Instrumental," and- and Doc just blew

everyone's mind. And I was a little kid and- and I just thought, "Oh my goodness, wouldn't it be

wonderful to play with that guy someday," and I finally got a chance to, you know, and, uh, he

became a good friend of mine, uh, and, uh ...

(04:05):

But there is some, so many ... You know one of my favorite memories of, I'll just say with Doc,

and it- it didn't happen here because we were on the road, but we had, this festival did exist at

that point. But there was a r-, there was a book called, um, In the Country of Country and they

did an article on, they wrote a whole, a whole chapter on Doc Watson and I got to read that to

Doc, uh-

Jerry Douglas (04:33):

... after the book came out. We were backstage waiting to go on and I read the whole chapter to

Doc and asked him, I says, "You know, just making sure, is this right, you said this?

Mark Coltrain (04:43):

(laughs)

Jerry Douglas (04:44):

Is this true, you said this," you know, and he said, "Yup, that's right, that's right." He said, "If I'd

a been a car mechanic, I would have, I would have put in just as much labor, and work, and time

as I do with this guitar." And he said, "I would've tried to be the best car mechanic I could be-

Mark Coltrain (04:59):

(laughs) Great.

Jerry Douglas (05:01):

... and, um, now I'm trying to be the best guitar player I can be."

Mark Coltrain (05:04):

Oh what a great story, yeah, huh.

Jerry Douglas (05:06):

But, you know, that's, that, that'll never leave me. But- but I was friends with- with Rosa

Lee, such a sweet- sweet woman and it ... Um, so many times looked over, been off stage and

looked over to the r-, to my right and Rosa Lee would be sitting in one of those rocking chairs

over there-

Hm.

Jerry Douglas (05:25):

... and just smile, just give you that smile, you know, it just melts you. Uh, and my ... And this

was the first festival that I could bring my family to.

Mark Coltrain (05:34):

Hm.

Jerry Douglas (05:35):

And I have, I have four children and they've all been here at various ages from four to grown, you know. And, uh, I've always, uh, I have memories of- of, you know, my son, Patrick, as a little blonde-haired kid with his bat, his baseball cap on backwards running around, and taking this, and, you know, Del McCoury grabbing him up or somethin' and we'd take a picture, you know, and we just, yeah. And now Patrick is, uh, works at the, at the, uh- uh, he's the head of, uh, video and- and photography for Opryland Productions, so he does all the Circle Three stuff that-

Hm.

Jerry Douglas (06:15):

... happens at the Opry, so he's ... And he knows so many people that come in there-

Mark Coltrain (06:20):

Yeah.

Jerry Douglas (06:20):

... you know. And- and, um, and just raising my kids up in this, in this music, in this business, yeah, this was the first place we would come every year to, uh, and this is where you found out who had more kids.

How many more kids you got? Uh, I'm- I'm almost afraid to ask you, are you still married-

and get out and play like this, and it was, it made this festival really special. That Uh- uh, it
was always the first stop-

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Yeah. But it- it is That's what makes this festival very- very special is to, it- it, that it is the

it's the first of the year.

Do you feel like that happened organically or do you think Doc had some sense of that when-
when this started, like, that- that might happen?
Jerry Douglas (07:49):
Well he may have, he may have had some- some idea about how that, you know, that this is, this
is part of, this is a, uh, such a part of renewal-
Mark Coltrain (07:58):
Hm.
Jerry Douglas (07:58):
every year.
Mark Coltrain (07:58):
Yeah.

Jerry Douglas (08:11): ... and all the buds come out, and everybody's sinuses go crazy-Mark Coltrain (08:16): (laughs) Jerry Douglas (08:16): ... and- and, uh ... But it's- it's, uh, it's a beautiful place and, uh, and- and, uh, I can't help but, you know, take my hat off to B Townes for all the work that he did with Doc in the first, in the first, you know, from the first mention of something happening here for Merle, for the, for the, uh, you know, for the- the, uh, garden for the blind. That's why we all came here in the first place was to, because we all knew Merle, and Doc, and we wanted to do something, anything. It was, we didn't know what to do, so this is what we did. Mark Coltrain (08:52): Yeah.

Jerry Douglas (08:52):

Appalachian State University Libraries Special Collections Research Center Oral History Program And- and it's- it's become, you know, I think, so much more, uh, than they ever thought-Mark Coltrain (09:00): Sure. Jerry Douglas (09:00): ... could have ever dreamed. Mark Coltrain (09:01): Yeah, you're- you're perfectly seguing into every question, thank you, that is awesome. Um, so-Jerry Douglas (09:07): I'm not trying. Mark Coltrain (09:07): Uh, no- no- no-Jerry Douglas (09:07): (laughs) Mark Coltrain (09:08): ... I know, but this is, this is great, so you're making my job easier. Um, can you talk a little bit about, um- um, that first year and, kind of, how you got involved with the festival? I mean, it sounds like you, uh, you had a great relationship with- with the Watsons, uh, beforehand, but ... And then, you know, even thinking back to your first performance or performances here, can you share a little bit about that?

Jerry Douglas (09:27):

Yeah, I mean, it's, kind of, funny, um, uh, I came here with New Grass Revival. I played with

them the night before in Green Acres, uh, a little place out- outside of, and over in western

Carolina, and, uh, it- it was a, just a wild crazy club, you know? You go in, there were sofas and

all these kind of things and it- it just a wild place and ... But I went that weekend, uh, I knew we

were coming here, and I was invited to be here. And so I just went with them to Green Acres and

we just had this wild- wild night the night before and when, then we come rolling into here in

their, in their converted bread truck-

Mark Coltrain (10:06):

(laughs)

Jerry Douglas (10:06):

... it's a bus, you know. (laughs) We come rolling in here, and all fall out of it, and get up on

stage, and T- Tony, uh, Tony was here, Tony Rice was here, and Chet Atkins, who, and Earl

Scruggs, and Marty Stuart, and Grandpa Jones, and I think, was Duane Eddy here too?

Mark Coltrain (10:28):

I'm not sure.

Jerry Douglas (10:29):

I'm not sure about Duane.

Mark Coltrain (10:29):

Yeah.

Appalachian State University Libraries Special Collections Research Center Oral History Program Jerry Douglas (10:30): Somebody was playing, somebody was playing a big hollow body electric-Mark Coltrain (10:34): Mm-hmm. Jerry Douglas (10:34): ... but I don't remember who that was. But it was amazing to all, for all of us to be standing up there at the same time, you know. And I'm thinking about where I was the night before which was just, like, the opposite of where I am right now. This just feels like church. Mark Coltrain (10:46): Hm. Jerry Douglas (10:47): Uh, we ... The audience wasn't that big, but it- it- it showed promise, you know, and that's all they wanted, that's all they wanted. We were all, kind of, just, kind of, uh, rolled up in here for free and- and did- did the thing. And, uh, had fun playing, I played with everybody that day. I, uh, I don't think there was anybody that, um- um, went up on the stage that I didn't play with that day. It was, uh, it was the same for everybody. Mark Coltrain (11:13): Hm. Jerry Douglas (11:14):

We- we were all happy to see each other, it was a bunch of friends and-

Mark Coltrain (11:18):

Hm.

Jerry Douglas (11:19):

... we come together for one of the best reasons, you know, possible, so it was a win-win situation for everybody.

Mark Coltrain (11:26):

Yeah, thank you. So, um, what makes performing here special year after year and why do you keep coming back year after year?

Jerry Douglas (11:36):

This- this is, this place is just in my blood now. Um, as long as I can perform, I hope to come back here and play at this festival and in, uh ... You know, it's- it's, we've ... When I came here, I was, you know, 30 years old and now I'm 66 years old, so it's, uh, it- it's a, we've grown up here and this is, sort of, like, we're, like, salmon. We, uh, we- we- (laughs) we don't come back here to die, but w-, (laughs) but we come back to the pl-, to a place that- that is- is, um, feels safe, and secure, and we know, uh, what to expect, and we know that everyone is gonna treat us with the utmost care and- and- and friendship, and- and- and then we, and then on top of all of that, we get to s-, we get to see each other, and talk, and have conversations that we haven't been able to have, you know, in a year, maybe.

(12:40):

We- we usually s-, uh, see each other here, then we'll see each other in Telluride, then we'll see each other at RockyGrass, (laughs) or Strawberry and, you know, it- it goes on like that. But those are giant festivals, those are huge festivals, you know, festivals that- that pull in, you know, 75,000 to, you know, 100,000 people-

Mark Coltrain (13:01):

Mm-hmm, yeah.

Jerry Douglas (13:03):

... a weekend. And a lot of people see you and it's a, it's- it's a, it's a huge card to have in your ...

Uh, it's a, it's a great arrow to have in your quiver-

Mark Coltrain (13:12):

Huh.

Jerry Douglas (13:12):

... I'll say that.

Mark Coltrain (13:13):

Mm-hmm.

Jerry Douglas (13:13):

It's, uh, it's a g- good calling card, it's a, it's a, if you played MerleFe- ... MerleFest is, you know, some people aspire to just, to just get on the MerleFest stage one time and that's it, that- that'll be it for them-

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Mark Coltrain (13:27):
Hm.
Jerry Douglas (13:27):
they don't care. But it's just, you know, it's that's kind of place to everybody that comes here,
after they see the shows and everything, uh- uh, you know. I can imagine kids, you know,
watching us play and- and just thinking, you know, "I want to be up there someday." And I think
that's what brings us back here-
Mark Coltrain (13:46):
Hm.
Jerry Douglas (13:47):
'cause we- we see our own children growin' up here, because it's that kind of place we can
bring them. And, uh, the families, you know, rotate in and out. (laughs) Buses, musicians, you
know-
Mark Coltrain (14:03):
Hm.
Jerry Douglas (14:03):
fads, trends, hair styles-
Mark Coltrain (14:06):
(laughs)

I hope no one does a hair style, uh-Mark Coltrain (14:10): (laughs) Jerry Douglas (14:10): ... uh- uh- uh, mashup for me-Mark Coltrain (14:13): (laughs) Jerry Douglas (14:14): ... 'cause, uh, I had 'em all. And, uh, but we just, we all went, we all went through so much and then we grew up, uh, but we grew up here. Mark Coltrain (14:24): Hm, thank you. Um, did the festival, performing here, year after year, impact your career in any way, yeah. Jerry Douglas (14:30): I'm sure it did. I mean this is a, also a very, uh, good place to network, you know, and, uh, record deals are struck here and met. I struck a managerial deal here, uh, on a handshake that lasted ununtil, you know, I lost the fellow.

(14:48):

But, um- um, yeah, it has. I mean, to- to belong to the, belong to the MerleFest family, uh, and it

definitely does add a- a link to the chain.

Mark Coltrain (15:04):

Gotcha, thank you. Um, are there any particular rituals or traditions that you do around this time

of year, either leading up to the festival, during, or after?

Jerry Douglas (15:15):

Well the trip in here is beautiful. Um, uh, I like to drive here from Nashville. I had to fly last

night, but I- I tried getting a ride with everybody in the van, but they all had somebody with

them, they wouldn't bring me. So- (laughs)

Mark Coltrain (15:29):

(laughs)

Jerry Douglas (15:29):

... so I flew in, and my tour manager picked me up last night at the airport in Charlotte and

brought me in. But the drive in here, you know, coming through the ... From Nashville, coming-

coming toward the Cumberland Plateau and then, uh, going down through the gorge past-past

Knoxville and through the gorge is where you- you get, you get that feeling that you're- you're a

very, uh, s-, you're a very small thing here. And then it doesn't let up, it, uh, it the- the beau-, the

beauty just keeps coming, you know, it's- it's just the Smoky Mountains, and you pass through

that, get down on the other side of the Smokies, and- and then fall into the Piedmont, you know?

It's- it's a very geographical place.

(16:12):

And, uh, I- I just li-, I like the drive, all the, yeah, all the pretty flowers in the middle of the road.

I mean, I'm a musician, I'm on the road all the time, I travel mostly at night.

Mark Coltrain (16:25):

Hm.

Jerry Douglas (16:26):

But when I can see what the country, what this country of ours looks like, it's, uh, it's amazing, it's amazing what all we have here and just open your eyes once in a while. But this, the- the drive over here and then into- into a s-, into an area that was once, uh, the furniture capital, furniture maker capital of the world, you know, and- and everything that's happened since, you know, uh, um, businesses falling out and- and then- then COVID hits us. Um, it hasn't been easy on the area, it's impacted the area.

Mark Coltrain (17:00):

Sure.

Jerry Douglas (17:00):

But, you know what, the people that show up, everybody I've talked to today, they have a huge smile on their face and they were happy to be here, and, uh, I- I- I was just as happy to see them. It's, uh, it's, uh, it's, uh, it's, uh, it's ... This festival gives us a chance to have a really good conversation with the people who are out there listening to us all the time, with the

fans-

Mark Coltrain (17:24):

Right.

Jerry Douglas (17:25):

... whatever you want to call. Kind of don't like to call them fans, it's, uh, always seemed like a weird term to me. But, um-

Mark Coltrain (17:31):

You're the second person that said that, actually, um-

Jerry Douglas (17:33):

Really?

Mark Coltrain (17:34):

Yes.

Jerry Douglas (17:34):

Well, it- it i-, uh, but, uh, it, uh, really is. I- I d-, uh- uh, so many of them are friends, you know? They walk away as- as a friend, you know, uh, and ... But this business is also, uh, there's also the- the other, the flip side of that is, uh, is you might meet somebody who you just, like, you know, s-, all of a sudden there's sparks, I mean not in a, any relationship kind of way.

It's just, like, any interest, you might hit a common interest just in going, just in passing, and you might su-, stand there and talk with that person for five minutes straight about that, and have the greatest conversation about that, and then you'll never see them again, and that's- that's the flip side of all of that. I mean, we do that every day-

Jerry Douglas (18:22):
you know, and- and, uh, that's I don't like that, you know, I- I- I would like for those things
to continue, but they don't, they just can't.
Mark Coltrain (18:31):
Yeah.
Jerry Douglas (18:31):
And that's the, that's that's the one, that's the one of the only negative things about being a
traveling musician.
(18:37):
Um, but, uh, I've gone, I've veered completely off subject.
Mark Coltrain (18:43):
That is okay, that is-
Jerry Douglas (18:44):
(laughs)
Mark Coltrain (18:44):
okay, I'm okay with that. Um, so, um, you mentioned, uh, earlier in your response to that
question, you mentioned COVID-

Jerry Douglas (18:50):

Hm.

Mark Coltrain (18:51):

... and that has come up a little bit in- in these interviews and I'm, kind of, curious to hear the year, I guess it was, it would've have been 2020. Did you ... That- that weekend that you would have been here, did you do anything that weekend to commemorate not being at MerleFest or ... And there's some people ... Uh, one person mentioned that, I forget the- the person who organized a Zoom, sort of, event. Well did you participate in that? Okay.

Jerry Douglas (19:13):

Yeah, um, when COVID struck, uh, you know, it was so (laughs) ... The first festival, you know, of the year, we knew was not gonna happen and that was really sad. But then somebody came up with the idea, let's do a Zoom of the festival and anybody can, like, um, we'll show this later, we'll show this Zoom of everybody playin' together, or talking to, at least talking to each other. At least we'll bring up the subject of MerleFest and we'll- we'll-have our own little MerleFest even though we can't get together this year, let's do the best we can-

Mark Coltrain (19:47):

Hm.

Jerry Douglas (19:47):

... with what we had to work with, and at that time Zoom was it.

(19:51):

And, uh, so we worked on, we worked on that. I do remember Zoo-, doing that and quite a few

festivals did it, because there was no festival that year. I mean, we were shut down as musicians.

We- we were completely shut down, could not play to an audience, didn't matter how big it was.

And that, uh, and that lasted for about a year and a half.

(20:12):

And, uh, but I have a studio, so I was able to work from the studio and I did, I did some, uh- uh,

some, uh- uh, Facebook, uh, Instagram, uh, Flux Fridays I called them.

Mark Coltrain (20:32):

Mm-hmm.

Jerry Douglas (20:33):

And I would come on, I would, I would come on live onto those every Friday at about 1:00 or

somethin' like that and- and play for half an hour, just talk, and play, and clown, be a clown, and-

and just, you know. And I did that all the way through, I did it from March to December-

Mark Coltrain (20:55):

Mm-hmm.

Jerry Douglas (20:56):

... and then I started running out of things to do. (laughs)

Mark Coltrain (20:58):

(laughs)

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Jerry Douglas (20:59):
And- and- and by then everything was shifting as well, you know, the whole world was, stopped
turning.
Mark Coltrain (21:05):
Mm-hmm.
Jerry Douglas (21:05):
And, uh, and so I had, I was able to work, so I- I did probably 40, 50 records while, durin-
Mark Coltrain (21:12):
Uh-
Jerry Douglas (21:12):
COVID-
Mark Coltrain (21:12):
yeah.
Jerry Douglas (21:13):
and just locked in my studio doing everything myself and sending them back out, and knowing
now they're records.
Mark Coltrain (21:19):
Right.

Jerry Douglas (21:19):
Uh, but it was a, it was a tough period and- and knowin' that, you know, um, MerleFest was the
first casualty for us and that's a big one-
Mark Coltrain (21:29):
Mm-hmm.
Jerry Douglas (21:30):
that's a very big one. And, uh, and it also, uh, it's big, uh, in monet-, mon-, financially, you
know?
Mark Coltrain (21:36):
Sure.
Jerry Douglas (21:36):
Some bands who was, this was their big deal, I mean this was, they were bringing out their new
band and we're gonna bring it out, we're just gonna wow the audience with it, boom COVID ca-
uh, canceled-
Mark Coltrain (21:49):
Yeah.
Jerry Douglas (21:49):
you know, all your dreams, and hopes, and everything. You've-
Mark Coltrain (21:51):

Mark Coltrain (21:59):

Yeah.

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But, you know, it was, it was tough, it it was tough for musicians and, uh, it's still tough-
Mark Coltrain (22:05):
Sure.
Jerry Douglas (22:05):
it's still tough, and we're all, you know, this year is really, kind of, like, you know, here we are
at MerleFest, real MerleF-, real MerleFest-
Mark Coltrain (22:17):
Mm-hmm.
Jerry Douglas (22:17):
and we're doing what we did in 2018 from-
Mark Coltrain (22:18):
Yeah.
Jerry Douglas (22:18):
1998?
Mark Coltrain (22:20):
Yeah.
Jerry Douglas (22:21):
Wow.

Mark Coltrain (22:22):

Yeah- yeah, thank you. Um, uh, we've ... I've certainly gotten some sense of this, as you've been

talking, but can you, just again, describe your, um, uh, your relationship with Doc and the

festival, sort of that- that, sort of that relationship and how has it evolved, I guess, over the

years as well?

Jerry Douglas (22:39):

Well, I heard first, uh, you know, I heard Doc Watson first on a Flatt and Scruggs record-

Mark Coltrain (22:43):

Yeah.

Jerry Douglas (22:43):

... I mentioned that before.

Mark Coltrain (22:45):

Yup.

Jerry Douglas (22:48):

And, uh- uh, and I- I met Doc ... Uh, the first time I met Doc, he and Merle were playing at a

place called Smithville, Virginia, and it was one of the hottest stages any of us have ever been

on, because it had a sheet, it had a tin roof, and it was about 108 in the shade. And I remember

Doc out there just sweating, you know, and he'd take that one arm up and, his forearm, and wipe

his, wipe his brow, and bring his, bring his pick back down and start right into another song. And

I can't ... It- it ... nothing bothered him and Merle too.

(23:23):

And then I met Merle backstage. Doc did a couple by himself and I walked up on the back of the stage and there was Merle, and we sat and we stood there and talked, you know, while dir-, and while Doc was out doing his thing, and what a nice guy. And Merle f, Merle was a, Merle was a really nice fellow. We were just talking a while ago, Merle was 37 when he died, you know, and-and then I was, you know ... Uh, then I think, uh, if I think about that, you know, I was 37 here. I- I turned 37 here.

And so what, you know, that- that's an odd place to go, but it's just a, uh- uh, he should have been here too, you know? He should have been here too, just, too, you know, maybe none of this would have even happened if it hadn't been for him and- and whatever, what happened, but he should have been here with us. He would have ha-, he would have been hangin' in here with, havin' a great time with everybody. You know, he's just like us, he's just- just like us, yeah.

Mark Coltrain (24:24):

Yeah, I asked that of a, of a s-, another musician, um, sort of, what the ... Uh, since you, uh, knew him fairly well, what do you think he would've thought of all this, Merle, what do you think he would've thought, because this is certainly ... I think, like, um, you alluded to this earlier, this is, sort of, uh, organically grown beyond a lot of peoples' ... They wouldn't, they wouldn't have expected this in 1988, right, what- what we have today.

Jerry Douglas (24:43):

No, we were just trying to build, we were just trying to pay for our garden, that's all, and it turned into all these buildings and- and, uh, you know, the- the, uh, this beautiful campus. But,

uh, yeah, I think if Merle was here, he would be laughing his ass off. He'd be, he ... If he, if he could see what's going on here and- and, you know, knowing that this was started all about him and his- his daddy wanting to, um, make, create this garden, uh, I think Merle would think it- it- it ... I- I don't, I don't think he would think it was funny, I think he would be, I think it would really be a cheerful thing. I think it would be a great thing for him. He- he, uh, he would, love the idea, you know? Maybe ... He's done so much for people who never met him, you know-

Um, do you remember the last festival that Doc performed at and do you remember the festival after, first festival after Doc's death, and can you share about each of those experiences, if there's anything that stands out at, um, to you about those- those times.

Jerry Douglas (26:25):

The last year that Doc was here, we all played as much as we could with him. We- we- we just, kind of, made a pact we would do that and- and we did every chance we got. And he was on stage all the time, you- you couldn't get rid of him. And I don't know if he knew, I don't know what- what was goin' on, but, uh, or maybe he wasn't going to, he was going to retire, I don't know.

But when I came back here the next year knowing Doc wasn't gonna be here, it was different.

Uh, it- it felt different to me, that I wasn't going to see Doc Watson. When I pulled up in the back stage area, I wasn't going to see that, uh- uh, Scott Rouse, and Dr. Rouse, and helping Doc,

uh, Watson get to his room in the back, uh, back- back of the stage where he'll, he held court all

day (laughs) long. It was great.

I'd just be doing nothing, you know, and all of a sudden I hear Doc say, "Take it, Jerry," (laughs) Mark Coltrain (28:43): (laughs) Jerry Douglas (28:43): ... just like, "Oh my God, (laughs) okay, I'll do it, I'll do whatever you ask." And I took him to the best cheeseburger place I could think of, Brown's Diner in Nashville,
Tennessee. So, it's a, just a little hole in the wall, but it's what Doc would like. I'd, you know-

And I think that's- that's ... What I take away from, uh, in the lar-, in the larger sense, in the business sense of all of this, this is one of the, um, most well run festivals in the world. A lot of volunteers here, but a lot of people who put a l-, other years in here who know how things work and how things don't work, and how to make things run smooth. Uh, but- but they were Christian people who wanted, uh, a festival that reflected their- their, uh, the way they are, you know, reflect, was a reflection on them and, uh, I think they did a wonderful- wonderful job of it, because you don't see anybody out here, you

don't see fights. You don't see people, you know ... And part of that is because they're not forced, they don't feel forced in any way to do anything. Mark Coltrain (34:17): Yeah. Jerry Douglas (34:18): And it's, uh, just a big ol' family gathering and it has become that over the years, you know, with all these people, the different- different, (laughs) uh- uh, generations of, you know?
